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Willow Class

In Willow Class we have come to the end of our big question, How Will We Get There? Last week we watched the animation Little Boat in Drawing Club.



We made our own boats, made our own Interplayland scenes to sail our boats on and described the scenes.



This week, we read the book Blown Away by Rob Biddulph, drew the main character (Penguin Blue), imagined who could be blown away on a kite with him and where they might land. In maths, we have been counting to 9 and 10, spotting patterns within 9 and 10 and working our 1 more and 1 less and working out additions with 10. We have looked at Indigenous Art from Australia, learnt about the meaning and copied some of the patterns. We looked for

signs of Spring around the school.

Beech Class

We have had a busy two weeks on Beech Class! In maths, we have been looking at measurement. This includes capacity, weight and volume. We got to fill up our own cups to full, half full, almost empty and empty! Additionally, we weighed things around the classroom and estimated whether the weights would be more, less or equal to eachother. Turns out our Vipers book is an equlivilant to the weight of 5 glue sticks! In English, we have finished writing our job adverts and now we are responded as mighty, brave adverntuers. We are learning the skills of persuasive writing.





We have completed our puppets in art and we are so proud of the way we used the glue and decorated our puppets.



Holly Class

In Holly we have been rounding off our key question 'Why should we study the Maya?' by writing and creating fact pages. We have been looking at some of our key questions from history lessons – asking how the society was structured and how and why the civilisation gradually disappeared. We have been trying to rewrite information in our own words, changing vocabulary and thinking about how to start sentences in different ways. In maths, we've moved on to fractions. We started with representing them and considering what the numerator and denominator actually mean. We've now started looking at equivalent fractions and it has been good to see the times tables practice paying off with children spotting the connection between the two areas.In drama, we've finished our stop motion parable retellings. We are looking forward to sharing them with a wider audience now they're finished. In PE, we've been playing tennis. We've progressed to small pitch rallies and we've been able to build up to using lots of different types of shot in games.

Silver Birch Class

We have enjoyed being outside as much as possible in Silver Birch these last two weeks. We have read our Vipers text, our class text and our own reading books around the outside of the school whenever we had some time!

In English, we have talked a lot about proof reading and editing. We wrote a missing person report based on the character Salim from our brilliant London Eye Mystery text. We also wrote a letter or statement as Salim to mum to explain (if he could) where he might be. To end the term, we have also been given the opportunity to write anything we would like, about anything we would like! We have had poems, horror stories, letters, war memoirs and diaries! The children have also written some emotional stories/reflections/prayers for the Stations of the Cross event. We have spent some maths lessons together working on problem solving and the children really impressed me with one task in particular. This task had to be carried out in silence but in groups of 4. One being an observer and the other 3 having to work out how to make a doughnut (like dominoes). The children showed great resilience and were actually able to be silent!



Also, in Learning for Life, we decided to focus on one of our Rules: 'Be Respectful'. We worked in small groups to discuss what respect looks like and what respect sounds like.



In history, we have discussed Alfred the Great and why he was actually great but also how the Saxons only used straight lines for writing- we experimented with this idea and had a go!
