Holly Class

In Holly, we are continuing to tell our story of the Stone Age villagers. We have travelled north and stumbled across a new village! Luckily we were able to persuade the chief to let us stay.

We have now started sharing our expertise with the new villagers. Their houses are not protecting them against the terrible weather so we as seaside villagers have encouraged them to use stone and earth to create more stable, warm houses.

In English, we have been writing our descriptions of the different types of Neolithic houses and in DT we have been learning the skills needed to create a mini version of a wattle & daub house. We've started with sawing wood and putting the structure in place, wove raffia in and out to build up the walls and next lesson will be using clay/mud materials to cement the wall in place.

In maths, we are adding and subtracting. We've been using place value counters to visualise which columns will be changing. This has also helped us when we've needed to exchange hundreds and tens in order to subtract.

We enjoyed another Godly Play session, this time focusing on the Creation story. There were lots of thankful comments and creations inspired by this. Our drumming lessons are going well and we are more confident with call and response games, listening and identifying the strokes needed and playing as a collective.

In PE, we are enjoying hockey – especially passing and shooting skills. We've had some very close target games.



Silver Birch Class

We have had another busy and varied two weeks. In English, we have started writing the entire narrative based on time travelling back to Ancient Egypt. The children have learned many skills such as adverb and action openers, using figurative language and many more to make our writing as effective as it can be. In science, we have been learning about heart rates. We carried out some short exercises (Star Jumps) and investigated what our resting heart rate was before exercise and then every minute thereafter. It was challenging to find our heart beat at times!

In P.E, we finally had a dry day to start Hockey. It was fun to learn a new skill. The children after just one session now want to play as a team and get straight to the game! Mrs Wood has been working extremely hard in art with the children making sarcophagus' using clay. It has been challenging but already these are looking amazing! We can't wait to show you the finished product.



In Learning for Life, we learned about empathy and being able to empathise with a refugee.

We discussed the daily challenges they face. We learned about Pharaohs and pyramids in history and we discovered that there are four types of pyramids. Ask your child if they can remember them!




PE hoodies

FRIENDS OF BOLNEY NEWS

Following on from my letter last week regarding the Friends of Bolney AGM, I am saddened to say that nobody came forward to take on a committee member role. As I explained, without named members, we will no longer hold a charity status or be able to apply for grants. With that in mind, it is crucial that we have at least a treasurer. Our current treasurer has kindly agreed to stay on in order to support the handover to someone new this year. Please, please let us know if you are able, or you know of anyone who would be able to take on this role. Moving forward the FoB may need to look very different. For example, in other schools where there is no PTA, families are asked to make a donation to school funds either on a monthly or annual basis instead of fundraising. Currently at Bolney, on an annual basis £6,000 of money raised by the FoB goes directly to curriculum resourcing (exercise books, stationery, photocopying paper and reading books etc) - this equates to a donation of around £60 per child per year. This is without the additional

enrichment opportunities that the FoB usually provide like Forest School, music, class workshops and annual subscriptions to educational sites such as Phonics Shed and Numbots which takes the cost to £10,000 (around £100 per child per year). Alternatively, small groups of parents could offer to run one-off events to raise money, such as a sponsored walk or a quiz night and families would be asked to support their child/ren's class running stalls at events such as a Christmas Fayre. I would be very happy to hear any ideas that you may have to either enable the FoB to continue, to run a fundraising event or to fill the treasurer's role. Your thoughts on an annual donation would also be appreciated.
